The 'Ride' with clinician registration is open through our website. You can sign up to ride with a clinician there, we have been getting more people signing up each day. The queen contest has been getting registrations in also.

We have several presenters again this year including the Iowa DOT, Purina feeds, Kalmbach Feeds, American National and many more. New this year we have Wayne Williams radio and TV personality here with his camera crew, he will be filming for his cable show along with doing a "Jeopardy" style trivia game all three days. We will also have 'Better Horse TV' at the fair, filming for their TV show.

PRESIDENTS' REPORT



Hello everyone and welcome to this edition of 'Iowa Horse' newsletter. This is the edition that we mostly concentrate on the Horse Fair and let you know what will be happening. The Horse Fair Committee has worked very hard this past year putting the event together. When the planning started, we were just hoping we would be able to hold the Fair this year. Several events around us have already been canceled, at least one due to the facilities being taken over for COVID related activities. Luckily, we are still a go and looking forward to having a good event.

We all know that the dangers of COVID are real and that certain groups of people are more affected by the virus than other groups. Each person must evaluate his or her risk factors and make an informed decision on whether to attend this year's event. It is hard to get accurate numbers of current hospitalizations when all we hear on the news is the numbers for new cases returning positive test results. I personally am on the edge of a high-risk group, and both my parents are high risk with my mother at 89 years of age and my dad over 90. My mother is in a nursing home and had a high number of positive COVID cases reported in the resident population (my mother included) and the home's staff. Luckily, with the new treatment methods, to my knowledge none of the residents died of COVID and the facility is now COVID free and trying to get back to a more normal existence for the residents.

Having said the above, I urge each of you to carefully consider the risks you are willing to expose yourself to and to take appropriate measures to mitigate said risks. I personally will attend all three days and the vendor setup day and wear a face mask, mostly to protect my father – and myself of course. I also feel relatively safe for myself wearing the face covering. Each of you will have to consider what is right for you and those around you.

For those of us that are still going to attend and enjoy the fair, the committee is always looking for volunteers to help with putting on the event. Volunteers can go to the Iowa Horse Council web site and signup for a specific day (starting with Thursday setup) and event. You can navigate there by going to the home page and click the following: *Iowa Horse Fair* \boxtimes *Volunteer at the Iowa Horse Fair*, and then click the Signup button, or enter the following URL in your browser - https://www.iowahorsecouncil.org/volunteer.

We always need more help than we have available to make everything work at the fair and this year will be no different. Volunteering to help for at least one shift during the day will get you a free admission ticket for that day! We will also need help the Saturday morning before the fair starts to decorate the horse barn for the Avenue of Breeds and to get the displays and banners in the barn set up. I hope several of our Horse Council members and horse clubs can volunteer for setting up the barn. When we have lots of people doing the work, it goes pretty quickly.

To me we are starting to get this COVID thing to be a lot like the flu in past years. The doctors have learned a lot on how to best treat the disease when someone comes down with it, and it is not as devastating as it was a year ago because of what has been learned. However, COVID is not something for those in high-risk groups to take lightly. I encourage each person that attends the fair to wear a face covering and to do a good job of hand washing and the other things that mitigate spreading germs. Hopefully with this event we can begin to get back to a normal life and have a good time at the fair as in past years.

Offer a student rate, offer horse fair admissions for new members, resource local horse businesses, add new business info into newsletters as well as clubs. David suggested to have a membership committee put together. If you want to help with this, please contact Carla Clark.

• **Publications** – Jill Ostrander and Danielle Kunze continue to work with the publisher each quarter to put together the newsletter that includes informational and educational resources for members along with industry events and issues. Please let them know if you have any articles of interest that you would like to share.

• Trails – Mike Monahan and Kevin Steward talked about the September Trail Ride in support of Elk Rock with Meg Hughes/Hughes Quarter Horses coordinating with the IHC to donate a raincoat to be auctioned off for the group and brought \$150 for the Friends of Elk Rock. They calm her when she is experiencing anxiety and have taught her patience in a world she has difficulty being patient in. My family enjoys the Halloween weekends at Elk Rock and often dress up in a theme, we were IHC Secretary all Toy Story characters one year and I absolutely love these IHC Publications Co-Chair family memories we make with our horses.

Currently we own four horses. Our two older quarter horses, who were our beginner, solid, and safe trail partners for several years. They have both gotten older and are now retired and used for the children and grandchildren. My husband rides Yankee, the TWH we adopted and I have just acquired a six year old Arabian, Blaze, from a very dear friend in Oklahoma. I'm looking forward to bonding with him and seeing a lot more sites making more wonderful memories.

Raymond Helmuth, owner operator of Helmuth Equine located south of Ames, Iowa, established his training stable in 2009 and has developed a reputation for specializing in problem horses and those who have been in wrecks. Having grown up with horses, he has an uncanny knack of determining what each horse needs, saving many problem horses and helping them become trusted and successful show, trail, and family horses. Often his work involves improving the relationship between the owner and the horse.

Raymond has driven, and successfully shown, everything from single cart horses to six horse hitches throughout the United States. An awards winner in draft horse competitions, Combined Driving Events, Pleasure Driving Carriage shows, Driving Derbies and Driving Trials, he is also well established nationally as an equine judge.

Best known as a driving horse trainer, Raymond also trains saddle horses for both English

and Western disciplines and has a successful farrier business and carriage for hire service. He has used his vast knowledge of horses to help develop special bits, which customers can purchase, as well as Comfy Fit harnesses, from his stable. Raymond has been helpful to many people, in the search for and purchase of horses that will safely meet their needs. His business is, indeed, full service.

Charros El Carretero



Charros El Carretero and Amigos El Carretero, is a labor of love for the Pina family. Since 2005, the Pinas have been practicing "Charreria" in the Des Moines area. Charreria is a large part of their culture that has been brought from Mexico. This riding style is about horsemen, horsewomen, roping, reining, and celebrating our love of horses. This sport is very family-oriented. Charros (cowboys) start as young as three, learning to perform rope tricks and basics of riding. Both men and women's teams travel throughout the country to enter competitions and performing in local parades. Indalecio Macedo



Indalecio Macedo was born and raised on the family farm in Jalisco, a state in Southeast Mexico. His late father, Indalecio Macedo Sr, was well-known throughout Mexico for his equestrian expertise and training abilities. So naturally Indalecio entered the family horse training business known to many as Dinastia Macedo (Macedo Dynasty.) At just 12 years old Indalecio began training his first horse. This experience taught him patience and that a horse cannot be rushed into learning what a human expects.

Indalecio has over 20 years of dedication, patience, and passion for horses. The breeds that he most often works with are Friesians, Andalusians, and variety of warmbloods. This resume gives him the ability to develop a horse's natural ability to excel in Alta Escuela (High School Horse Training.) This is a program that contains elements of dressage, combined with movements based upon classi-

cal Spanish riding. A typical horse in this program will train for a minimum of two-three years to master all elements of Alta Escuela.

Indalecio has had the great honor of training with the masters of the Real Escuela Andaluza del Arte Ecuestre, which is Spain's most prestigious and oldest equestrian training school. He is also the owner and main trainer of Macedo Rancho Horse Training and Riding Team. No matter where he travels to train, compete or entertain, his favorite spot is the Iowa Horse Fair, where he is able to share his joy of beautiful horses and the people who admire and enjoy them. James Puderbaugh



James Puderbaughs' education in horsemanship spans more than 35 years. James has competed successfully in many western events over the years, but most recently has found his niche in the popular Ranch Riding and Ranch Horse Versatility classes. James' quiet way with horses and his belief that all horses should have a solid foundation from the beginning creates horses that are relaxed, broke and consistent. James is also a public elementary school teacher. His teaching ability allows him to communicate and coach his clients to success in the show pen. James' clear and consistent teaching methods are turning out champions in youth, amateur and open divisions. James and his clients have successfully competed in multiple AQHA events. At the 2016 Quarter Horse World show, James won ninth place in the level two Senior Ranch Riding and seventh in the level three Senior Ranch Riding out of 121 riders in the open division. James and his daughter Kate also have earned multiple American Buckskin Registry Association's World Championships titles in both the youth and open divisions at

the All-American Quarter Horse Congress. In 2019, James and his daughter, Kate, were open high point American Buckskin Registration Association champion and were five-time medalists including reserve champion Youth Ranch Riding and two top-ten finalists.

James lives with his family on their ranch in St. Charles, Iowa where he trains horses, coaches riders and conducts clinics. He also finds time for his main job of teaching first grade for the Des Moines Public Schools.

Van Hargis is known as one of today's most versatile horsemen/clinicians. Van has trained and competed in the show arena in events ranging from reining to calf roping, and competed in the rodeo arena in the timed events. Training horses for Van all started over 35 years ago for the wife of world-renowned saddle maker Billy Cook. Van's practical experiences in the show ring, rodeo arena, and on the ranch coupled with a dynamic speaking ability have made him one of the most exciting presenters and requested clinicians. Van uses each presentation he gives as an opportunity to share how the horse has helped him realize the important lessons in his life. He utilizes the arena and the horse to emphasize the most fundamental lesson : the need for a solid foundation, in

horse training as well as everyday life. Van's ability to use the horse to educate, motivate, inspire, and entertain will encourage you to take a long look at your life, your relationships, and your horsemanship. Not only does Van make lasting impressions on his audiences, he is highly respected among his peers for his horsemanship and his ability to recognize good horsemanship. He has judged some of the largest ranch horse competitions in the country, and he frequently is asked to judge similar events at horse fairs and horse expos. In fact, Van has judged the very popular Extreme Cowboy Race more times than any other judge of the event. Van was with the popular TV show competition for its first three seasons.

Van Hargis has been featured in several major publications including the <u>Quarter Horse News</u>, <u>Horse and Rider</u>, <u>Western</u> <u>Horseman</u>, and <u>Performance Horse</u>. Van's articles have also been regular contributions in other national publications such as <u>National Foundation Quarter Horse Journal</u>, <u>Today's Horse</u>, <u>Horse & Rider</u>, and <u>Horse Talk</u> magazine. His writing has appeared in countless regional and local publications. In 2006, Van was selected by <u>HorseCity.com</u> to be the year-long trainer of the Free Horse Contest. Van selected, started, and hauled "Feature", an APHA-registered paint gelding.

Van's versatility extends far beyond his horsemanship and training ability. He frequently is asked to compete in celebrity team roping or cutting horse events, as well as the occasional golf tournament. Van has been a keynote speaker at 4-H and FFH banquets, the Certified Horsemanship National Convention, and other related events; Van has been the guest on literally hundreds of radio programs throughout the country. Van hosts a weekly podcast "Ride Every Stride" on iTunes. He currently has more than 12,000 listeners. This listenership is growing rapidly. He has the ability to deliver an exciting, educational, motivational, inspirational, and entertaining program to audiences regardless of the setting or the topic. From colt-starting clinics to versatility ranch horse demonstrations, presentations on collection to the concept of fear, trust, and confidence, Van finds a way to relate practical methods and messages to everyone. Van believes in empowering the horse and the horseman to help each other in forming a relationship that focuses on success. It is because of his ability and emphasis on always remaining true to the horse that he has been given the title: a True Horsemen.

The Spotted Draft horses can be found throughout history, typically as war horses. With their popularity in Europe for centuries, the breed sparked interest in North America in the mid 1960's when an Iowa breeder had collected more than 20. By 1995, the North American Spotted Draft Horse Association was created to preserve and promote draft horses with pinto coloring and to raise awareness of these rare and beautiful horses.

The North American Spotted Draft horse should have conformation which closely reflects the draft type they most resemble (Percheron, Belgian, Shire, etc) to be accepted into the breed association. There are four categories in the registry: Premium; Regular; Breeding Stock and



Indexed, with each requiring specific percentages and coloring characteristics respectively to be considered.

The conformation at maturity of a North American Spotted Draft Horse is an average height of 15 to 17 hands with a weight of approximately 2,000 lbs. These typically short, strong, muscled horses have an intelligent appearing head, with active ears, powerful arching necks, and upright shoulders which make this breed suitable for power rather than speed. Pinto coloring is required for the breed acknowledgement and may include tobiano, overo, or tovero patterns. Black and white, bay and white, and sorrel and white are the most common in the Spotted Draft breed. These beautifully colored horses can be seen as an all-around draft and make great carriage horses.

The Animal Rescue League's (ARL) Kruidenier Second Chance Ranch is a safe haven for horses rescued from abuse, neglect and abandonment; it is also a temporary home for other barn animals waiting for new homes.

While horses often come to us in very rough shape, we give them the nutrition and care they need to become mentally and physically healthy. Once they are ready, we help find their forever homes.

The Second Chance Ranch does accept owner surrendered chickens, ducks, goats, pigs, and other farm animals. In the near future, owner surrendered horses will also be accepted. This means, if someone has a horse they can no longer care for, they can call and discuss signing over ownership to the ARL. The horses accepted will need to be sound, healthy, and halter broke.

When an animal is ready for adoption it will be posted on the ARL website. If a person is interested in adoption, they will be asked to fill out an adoption application, and set up an appointment to visit the animal. If the horse is broke to ride, a riding lesson/visit will also be required to help decide if the horse is a good fit for the person adopting. People must be 18 to sign an adoption contract. Adopters are required to provide shelter, ample space for the horse to move around freely, and a pasture friend.

Some of the horses and barn animals are also available for fostering. This means the person wanting to foster will take care of the animal as if it were their own. Any expenses are tax deductible, and the animal is still available for adoption. There is a foster application that would need to be approved and staff does a site visit for fostering or adopting.

Kruidenier Second Chance Ranch Arena

The ARL Kruidenier Second Chance Ranch hosts multiple educational clinics and seminars each year in the spacious Second Chance Ranch Arena. The arena is also available to rent for private functions or open riding.
